

**Terms of Reference for the Evaluation of the Student Police  
Cadet (SPC) Project in Karnataka implemented by Home  
Department**

**1. Study Title:**

The title of the study is “*Evaluation of the Student Police Cadet (SPC) Project in Karnataka*”.

**2. Department implementing the scheme:**

The Home department is implementing the scheme along with Education department and supported by the departments of Transport, Forest, Excise and Local Self Governments.

**3. Background and the context:**

Today 50% of India’s population is less than 25 years of age. It has been predicted that by the year 2030, India will have the world’s largest population (approximately 153 crore), of which the youth would constitute about 95 crore, i.e. 63%. Of the total population of Karnataka which is 6.11 crore, youth constitute 30.44% (2011 census). There is growing perception that there is a tendency among the youth to disregard the norms of the society and lead an unhealthy and irresponsible life. The SPC project envisages forging of a student community that is physically and emotionally healthy.

The concept of SPC first originated in 2006 as a small initiative “*Janakeeyam*” of Kochi (Kerala State) City Police involving high school students. It was later replicated in other districts. Looking at its success, this was evolved as a bigger project under the nomenclature Student Police Cadet (SPC) in 2010 by the Government of Kerala.

The SPC concept was adopted with a few changes by the State of Karnataka. The vision of Student Police Cadet (SPC) in Karnataka is to build a society that is socially responsible, work to tackle community issues and foster the health of the nation. The mission is to train and develop the youth of today to become social leaders of tomorrow. The Government of Karnataka gave administrative approval to the project vide its order number HD/175/POP/2014(Part-1), dated: 10.10.2014.

The SPC project is school level intervention intended to develop the inner potential of the younger generation and to make them flag bearers of a prosperous India. It aims at inculcating in the students respect for law, discipline, civic, sense, empathy towards vulnerable sections of society and resistance to social evils. The project also aims to enable the youth to explore and develop their innate capabilities, thereby empowering them to resist the growth of negative tendencies such as social intolerance, substance abuse, deviant behaviour and anti-establishment violence. It also strives to strengthen within them a sense of commitment towards their family, the community and the environment. It also envisages that in a democratic state there must occur a paradigm shift in the policing function; from enforcement to facilitation of law. The 41<sup>st</sup> All India Police Science Congress (Dehra Dun 2011) has recommended that all States implement SPC. The nation wise rollout of the SPC project is being considered by Union Home Ministry. Since, Karnataka has already started the programme from 2014, its Home Department, vide letter no. 01/SPC/COP/2016-17, dated: 25-06-2016 has requested KEA for evaluation of the programme.

#### **4. Training Manuals:**

The Home Department has brought out outdoor and indoor manuals for trainers for the first year. In addition to this, a training manual by name "Sudari" has been brought out by Directorate of Secondary Educational Research and Training (DSERT), Bengaluru. It has instructions for using the manuals and are given to teachers. The manuals have chapters related to leadership, health and hygiene environment individual development, security, stress management, Yoga etc. Besides this, teachers also can collect videos from the office of Commissioners of Police office. After the training, a self-assessment is done invariably and suitable action taken in areas required.

#### **5. Selection of schools/cadets:**

Schools having 250 students are selected. In case of selection of schools with less than 250 schools permission is required to be taken from State Nodal Officer of the programme. In the first year, students from 9<sup>th</sup>&10<sup>th</sup> standards are selected as junior cadets. Senior cadets are proposed to be selected from 11<sup>th</sup>& 12<sup>th</sup> standard after approval of the Government. There can be two battalions per school, each having 22 cadets. In schools having co-education there has to be a battalion for girls exclusively. Healthy students with good physical conditions

are selected and consent of parents is compulsorily taken for enrolment. The duties and responsibilities of Community Police Officers (CPO), Assistant Community Police Officers (ACPO), Principals of the colleges and Head constables and Constables are clearly laid down in the execution of the programme effectively.

**6. Details of uniform supplied:** Uniforms supplied for cadets, CPOs, ACPOs are as follows –

- a) **For cadets:** Khaki dress, Barret cap, web belt, black shoes, khaki socks, line yard with whistle, name plate, SPC shoulder badge monogram, PT dress (white T shirt & pants) white socks. (estimated cost Rs. 6050)
- b) **For CPOs /ACPOs:** Khaki uniform, PT dress and accessories (estimated cost Rs. 6450).

**7. Execution of the Project:**

Physical Education Teachers and other teachers at the high school level are appointed as Community Police Officers (CPOs) and Assistant Community Police Officers (ACPOs) to organize various activities of the programme like parade, physical training, instructional practise and cross country race. The parades and physical trainings are got done by Drill Instructors and Assistant Drill Instructors chosen from the jurisdictional civil police station. The ACPOs and CPOs are assisted by local jurisdictional Police Inspectors, who are known as Police Student Liaison Officers (PSLO), and Drill Instructors. Refresher courses for two days for CPOs/ACPOs/DIs/ADIs are conducted at Bengaluru. The ACPOs, CPOs, Drill Instructors and Assistant Drill Instructors are paid an honoraria of Rs. 1000 per month for conducting these activities on every Saturday afternoon. Guest lecturers are also paid honoraria, as and when they are engaged. Refreshment to cadets are given after the completion of the classes/parades. The indoor and outdoor classes, computer training in internet and computer applications are then given to the cadets. Guest lecturers/officers of other departments are requested to conduct classes on various other issues like health, environment, transport, excise, law and order, personality development and other social issues. The schools have been equipped with desktop, laptops and projectors for indoor training and classes, with support from local police stations for system failure/troubleshooting.

Field trips to National Parks and wildlife sanctuaries, forests, reservoirs and dams are also conducted in order to expose the cadets to the diverse natural resources of the State. Community level activities such as blood donation, pain and palliative care and visits to orphanages and old age homes are organized in order to sensitize the cadets on the role of an individual in spreading the message of caring and sharing. Camps are organized to bring out the innate potential in the cadets, by making them engage in unique activities such as hiking, trekking and treasure hunts. Orientation programmes on life skills activities are emphasized. The CPO, ACPO and DI encourage the learner cadets to improve their general health, good habits and cleanliness. Observances of national days are given importance in the programme to enhance the levels of patriotism, secularism and the willingness for co-operation, which are already inherent in the cadet. Thus a cadet is given an opportunity to awaken and improve his/her spiritual quotient during his/her schooling. The cost for conducting one day field visits and Dasara/Summer camps conducted for 3 days at the state level are paid.

## **8. Institutional arrangements and Monitoring:**

The programme is monitored at the State, District and School levels by the officers of Police and Education departments. The Committees constituted at the State and District levels deal with the responsibility of making policy decisions and implementing the SPC programme with efficiency and effectiveness are as under:

### **A) The State level Advisory Committee (SLAC):**

This is the highest policy-making body in the SPC hierarchy, with authority to approve selection of schools, formulate guidelines for programme implementation, issue directions to SPC programme officials, and ensure adherence to project guidelines by all stakeholders. SLAC Committee comprises of:

1. Chairman - Director General and Inspector General of Police.
2. Convener- Commissioner of Police, Bangalore City.
3. Member Secretary- State Nodal Officer, Student Police Cadet Project.

Members

4. Divisional Deputy Commissioners of Police, Bangalore City.

and others as per discretion and decision of Government, or as felt necessary by State Committee. The State Advisory Committee has the responsibility of monitoring and assessing State wide programme implementation, which is done through the State Nodal Officer, a designated Inspector General of Police level officer, with State wide authority. State Advisory Committee is required to develop and submit an annual programme implementation report to the Government. State Advisory Committee meets quarterly to monitor progress and status of state wide SPC programme implementation. The State Nodal Officer is the Member Secretary of State Advisory Committee.

**B) Divisional-Level Advisory Committee**

1. Patron- Divisional Deputy Commissioner of Police, Bangalore City.
2. Member Secretary and Divisional Nodal Officer are the Assistant Commissioners of Police of concerned Division, Bangalore City.
3. Members: Jurisdictional Police Inspectors, Bangalore City.

**C) School Level Advisory Committee:**

1. Chairman - School Principal / Head Master/Head Mistress.
2. Convener – Jurisdictional Police Inspector / Circle Police Inspector.
3. Committee Secretary – Jurisdictional Sub-Inspector of Police.

This committee has the responsibility for overseeing and supporting programme implementation in the school; having meetings every month.

**9. Progress achieved:** 40 high schools, having 1760 cadets are covered at the rate of 44 student cadets per school in the four districts namely Bengaluru, Shimoga, Udupi and Mysuru. The budget allocation and expenditure incurred in 2014-15 and 2015-16 are given below. The details of Police Stations schools and names of Principals, CPOs, ACPOs their telephone numbers and cadet strength are given in *Annexure* of the ToR.

**10. Objectives of the Programme:**

- Moulding a society which is law-abiding.
- Inculcating the values of civic sense, sense of quality, secular outlook, spirit of enquiry, power of observation, leadership qualities and love of adventure among the cadets.
- Fostering among the cadets social commitment, readiness of service and love for the fellow member of society.
- Equipping the cadets to reach against social evils like terrorism, separatism, communalism and drug abuse.
- Enabling the cadets to work with the police in ensuring internal security eradicating crimes, maintaining law and order, traffic control and social service.
- Bringing up SPC as an independent action force like any other voluntary organization such as NCC, NSS/Bharath Scouts and Guides.
- Promoting among the cadets love of nature and awareness/ regarding the protection of environment and the readiness to be active in managing disasters.
- Promoting the readiness to be helpful and active during an emergency and in solving social issues.
- Moulding a model student community that upholds high values of character and conduct.
- Shaping a young community which strives selflessly for the all-round progress of the society as a whole.

**11. Purpose of the Study:**

1. The purpose of the study is to assess the effectiveness of the SPC project and to know whether all the objectives set have been achieved or not. Further, to find out loopholes in implementation and analyse the training gaps, if any, and requirement of infrastructure and material.
2. To assess the individual and social impact of the SPC programme at reaction level, learning level, behaviour level and results/outcomes.
3. To compare the SPC programme of Kerala Government and to suggest for modifications improvements if required in Karnataka for better and effective implementation for the better outcome.

4. A Comparison of SPC programme with NCC/NSS/Scouts and Guides to be done with their objectives so as to formulate the recommendations on course structure, training and recognitions/reservation in Jobs and Professional Courses for SPC candidates for its popularisation.....

## **12. Sampling and Evaluation Methodology:**

There are 25 schools in Bengaluru, 5 each in Shimoga, Mysuru and Udupi. There is no sampling for selection of schools as all the schools should be covered for evaluation. From each school, at least 5 boys and 5 girls should be personally interviewed about indoor and outdoor classes and all the activities of the programme. FGDs to be held at the school levels with PSLOs/CPOs/ACPOs/DIs/ADIs and the guest lecturers who are invited frequently in SPC.

Separate FGDs to be held with parents and SDMCs to elicit their views on all aspects of the programme. As a control, a Government School or Government aided or Private High School which is not covered under SPC is to be selected in the vicinity and their Head Masters/SDMCs/students to be interviewed about their opinion on SPC for inclusion or exclusion with reasons. Five such schools to be selected in Bangalore and one each in Mysuru, Shimoga and Udupi.

## **13. Evaluation questions (Inclusive not exhaustive):**

1. What have been the reasons or motivation for the students who are cadets under SPC?
2. Is SPC different from the Scouts and Guides programme and the National Cadet Corps (NCC) programme on going in schools and Colleges? If yes, in what respects?
3. The SPC programme covers only Government and Government aided schools. Is there any demand from private sector schools for coverage? If yes? What is the reason for not covering them?
4. What is the assessment of training imparted to cadets on all dimensions of SPC as per training manual developed by Karnataka Secondary Education Research and Training viz. 'Sudari'? Is the content, duration and dimension of the training adequate? What needs to be added or deleted from this?

5. What is the view of cadets regarding the physical training part of the programme with special focus on the difficulty, relevance and utility? Do they have something to be added or something that needs to be removed from the training?
6. What can be done to further improve the programme in terms of coverage, training needs and gaps in infrastructure/material/staff?
7. How often the Advisory and monitoring committees meet in a year? What are the important suggestions made by these committees during the course of implementation? Have the suggestions been considered for its improvement of the project?
8. Should some weightage/advantage be added for those cadets who successfully complete the SPC programme as is done under NCC/NSS/Bharat Scouts and Guides or as in Kerala where a small percentage of reservation is made for recruitment of constables?
9. Is the Police force and staff of Education Department adequate enough to handle the project in the existing schools? If not what could be done for sustainability of the project?
10. What is the SWOT analysis for the programme?
11. What is the individual and social impact of the SPC project at the levels of (a) Learning, (b) Reaction, (c) Behaviour and what is the outcome of the SPC in the community? What is the perception of the students and parents about the project?
12. Should the programme be continued and/or extended to all over Karnataka? If yes, with what changes?

#### **14. Deliverables time schedule:**

The State Nodal Officer SPC, Home department to furnish the available information at the head office and to instruct all the District Police officers and Head masters of High schools to provide the required information connected with the study to the evaluation consultant organization. The district officers of Police and Education department to be addressed by the SNO, SPC for co-operating in holding Focused Groups Discussions (FGDs) with the stake holders of the project. It is expected to complete the study in 5 months' time, excluding the time taken for approvals. The evaluating agency is expected to adhere to the following timelines and deliverables.



- a. Work plan submission : Two months after signing the agreement.
- b. Field Data Collection : One month from date of work plan approval.
- c. Draft report Submission : One month after field data collection.
- d. Final Report Submission : One month from draft report submission.
- e. Total duration : 5 Months

**15. Minimum Qualifications of Core team members:**

The core team should comprise of the following members (the list is inclusive not exhaustive) should have technical qualifications/experience as stated below-

- i. A masters in Social Science/Physical Education minimum with 5 years' experience in the field of education/physical training. (Principal Investigator),
- ii. A person who is an advocate or proficient in Indian Law(Member), and,
- iii. A naturalist who is at least a graduate in life sciences and preferably has teaching experience.(Member)

**or more/better, and in such numbers that the evaluation is completed within the scheduled time prescribed by the ToR.**

**Consultant Evaluation Organizations who do not meet these criteria will not be considered for doing the evaluation.**

**16. Agency for evaluation:**

The evaluating agency should be finalized as per provision of the Karnataka Transparency in Public Procurement Act and Rules, but without compromising on the quality.

**18. Qualities Expected from the Evaluation Report:**

The following are the points, only inclusive and not exhaustive, which need to be mandatorily followed in the preparation of evaluation report:-

- a) By the very look of the evaluation report it should be evident that the study is that of Home Department, Bengaluru and Karnataka Evaluation Authority (KEA) which has been done by the Consultant Evaluation Organization. It should not intend to convey that the study was the initiative and work of the Consultant Evaluation Organization, merely financed by the Home Department, Bengaluru and Karnataka Evaluation Authority (KEA).
- b) The evaluation report should generally conform to the United Nations Evaluation Guidelines (UNEG) "*Standards for Evaluation in the UN System*" and "*Ethical Standards for Evaluations*". The report should be complete and logically organized in a clear but simple language. Besides conforming to the qualities covered in the Terms of Reference, it should be arranged in the following order –
  1. Title and opening page.
  2. The Index.
  3. List of acronyms and abbreviations.
  4. Executive Summary – A stand-alone section that describes the program, gives purpose and scope of evaluation, the evaluation methodology, key findings, constraints and recommendations.
  5. Sector history – A section that briefly covers the history of the sector under which the scheme/program being evaluated falls. It should give recent data taken from reliable and published sources.
  6. The objectives and performance of the program being evaluated – The section will include the stated objectives of the program and the

physical and financial achievements of the program in the period of evaluation. It should cover the description of the target group, the aim of the program and the method of selection of beneficiary (if included in the program).

7. Review of literature / past evaluation reports.
8. Evaluation Methodology – This should include the sample size and details of sample.
9. Findings of the evaluation study.
10. Limitations/constraints in the evaluation study.
11. Recommendations that flow from the evaluation.

This should be followed by the following Annexures –

- (A) The sanctioned Terms of Reference of the study.
- (B) The survey tools and questionnaires.
- (C) List of persons with addresses personally interviewed.
- (D) The places, dates, and number of persons covered by Focus Group Discussions (FGD).
- (E) Compilation of case studies / best practices.
- (F) Table showing details of major deviations, non-conformities, Digressions of the program.

## 19. Cost and Schedule of Budget release:

Output based budget release will be as follows-


- a. The First instalment of Consultation fee amounting to 20% of the total fee **can** be paid as advance to the Consultant Evaluation Organization after the approval of the inception report, but only on execution of a bank guarantee of a scheduled nationalized bank valid for a period of at least 12 months from the date of issuance of advance.
- b. The Second instalment of Consultation fee amounting to 40% of the total fee **can** be paid to the Consultant Evaluation Organization after the approval of the Draft report.

- c. The Third and final instalment of Consultation fee amounting to 40% of the total fee **will** be paid to the Consultant Evaluation Organization after the receipt of the 30 hard copies in English and 30 hard copies in Kannada and 3 soft copies of the final reports in both the languages in such format as prescribed in the agreement, along with all original documents containing primary and secondary data, processed data outputs, study report and soft copies of all literature used to the final report.

Taxes will be deducted from each payment as per rates in force. In addition, the Consultant Evaluation Organization is expected to pay statutory taxes at their end.

This is intended to be an internal evaluation study, which means that the cost of the study will be borne by the line department. They are expected to allot the work to a competent evaluating agency following the procedure of Karnataka Transparency in Public Procurement Act and Rules and in consultation with the Karnataka Evaluation Authority. This should be done as early as possible, but not later than 30 days from the approval of the ToR. The evaluating agency should present the inception report before the Technical Committee of the KEA within 30 days of the allotment of study to them.
